THE BUILDING IN THE CORRECT PANTS, SHIRTS, AND SHOES

The dress code will be strictly enforced.



*Athletic Teams - the Head Coach for each team, with prior administrative approval, will determine game-day apparel for their teams.

Honor/Star Roll students must wear their lanyards at all times.

Final decisions on any dress code questions will be decided by the administrative team.

Shoes

- Must be closed-toed.
- Must not be house shoes, flip-flop style, or Crocs.
- Must be worn at all times in school.

Shirts

- Must be a SOLID polo or crewneck of any color.
- Must not be shorter than hip-length and must be at the pant line at all times (hands up).
- No GRAPHICS or patterns of any kind.
- Hunter t-shirts/ sweatshirts are available for purchase and can be worn daily.
- Hunter t-shirts
 purchased outside of
 Hunter are allowable
 per administrative
 approval.
- Cardigan sweaters, sweaters, fleece pullovers, quarter-zip, and crewneck sweatshirts must be SOLID in color.
- Hoodies may NOT be worn in the building at any time.

Outerwear

 All coats and full zip or full-buttoned jackets must be kept in lockers until going outside.

Pants, Shorts, Skirts

- Must be SOLID cotton-twill khaki-colored, navy, gray, black, or denim blue jeans.
- Must be worn at the waistline, be size appropriate, and cannot be longer than knees or shorter than fingertips.
- May not have holes, patches, or visible skin showing.
- May not be leggings, jeggings, or athletic/sweatpants.
- May not be skirts/skorts or dresses

 unless for religious purposes with documentation from your religious organization.

Accessories

- No hats, bandanas, scarves, or other head coverings may be worn in the building at any time unless for religious purposes with documentation from your religious organization.
- Hair must not cover the eyes.

Mandatory: At Hunter Middle School, we use the TI-34 Multiview calculator starting in 6th grade. This calculator will be used in each of their math classes through the end of 8th-grade math. An investment in a personal calculator will aid your child in class as well as with homework and TN Ready testing. These calculators can be difficult to find in stores in August due to high demand. We suggest you either order them online or through the school. Here at school, we can purchase the TI-34 at cost through a supplier for as little as \$16.19; however, the more we order the more that price will drop. The official price will be set based on the number ordered. We will send home an order form at the beginning of the school year. Money will be due BEFORE the order is made.

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The increase in use of cell phones and personal communication devices by students during the school day has become a significant distraction in the school environment and is impeding student learning. While there is considerable dependence on cell phones and personal communication devices, additional guidance is needed to protect valuable time for learning and foster and maintain positive school environments.

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Devices are defined as cell phones, personal communication devices, and personal electronic devices including, but not limited to, wearable technology such as eyeglasses, rings, earbuds, headphones, or watches that have the capability to record, live stream, or interact with wireless technology.

Restrictions to device use:

Taking photos or recording videos, whether by cell phone or any other device, is prohibited.

15 16 17 Using cell phone cameras to record altercations on school grounds or at school events is prohibited. In such cases, phones may be confiscated as evidence and consequences will be assigned. Consequences may be issued for the person who records and/or shares an altercation.

18 19 Cell phone recordings done outside of school that are shared by and with members of the school community and cause harm toward students and/or a significant disruption in school are prohibited.

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Consequences for cell phone violations will be issued in alignment with the HCS Code of Acceptable Behavior. The consequences for violating this cell phone policy may be in addition to any other violations of the HCS Code of Acceptable Behavior. Finally, students bring cell phones and personal electronic devices to school at their own risk. School staff are not liable for lost or stolen cell phones and are not responsible to conduct any investigations regarding the loss of a student electronic device.

Students may possess devices so long as they are not seen or heard, and should be stored in closed pockets, backpacks, purses, bags, assigned locker, automobile, or other school approved location.

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- When technology is utilized to support the instruction of standards in the classroom, the use of chrome

- permission to use a cell phone as a device to assist with instruction at his/her discretion. For grades 9-30 12, each individual school may choose to allow cell phones in designated areas during lunch period.

- Students may be allowed to use a cell phone as a tool for hearing, translation, or other functions for 33
- students with a 504 Plan or IEP that articulates both the need and parameters for use. All staff will be 34

Dear Parents/Legal Guardians,

In order for students to receive over the counter medications at school, a permission form must be completed by the parent or guardian. The over the counter medications must be brought to the school by the parent for elementary children or by students in middle or high school if brought to the clinic at the beginning of the day. The medications must be brought to the clinic in the original packaging with the child's name on the packaging.

If you would like over the counter medications to be available for your child during the school day, please make sure that your child has permission for the School Nurse to administer over the counter medications by completing the attached form. If the form is not completed or over the counter medications are not brought to the clinic, no over the counter medications will be given to your child by the School Nurse. The permission form will be confidential and placed in your child's health folder.

As a reminder, if you give permission for your child to be given an over the counter medication during the school day, it must be sent to school in the original packaging. Your child's name must be on the packaging.

On the back of this letter is the Hamilton County School District's medication policy. Please keep this policy for future reference, especially if your child will be taking prescribed and/or over the counter medications at school.

The School Nurses welcome your questions and concerns. If we can assist you in any way, please call. We also ask that meds prescribed to be given twice daily and three times daily be given at home if possible.

What information will I need?

Basic medical history and health information. Insurance company and policy number. Doctor, dentist, and medical specialist contact information. Hospital preference and contact information.

How do I register my first student?

IMPORTANT: If you followed the steps on the previous page, you may Jump to Step number 3.

- 1. Go to: https://hamiltoncounty-tn.finalforms.com/
- 2. Click LOGIN under the Parent Icon.



- 3. Locate and click the ADD STUDENT button.
- 4. Type in the LEGAL NAME and other required information. Then, click CREATE STUDENT.
- If your student plans to participate in a sport, activity, or club, then click the checkbox for each. Then, click UPDATE after making your selection. Selections may be changed until the registration deadline.
- 6. Complete each form and sign your full name (i.e., 'Uonathan Smith') in the parent signature field ion each page. After signing each, click SUBMIT FORM and move on to the next form.

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7. When all forms are complete, you will see a 'Forms Finished' message.

IMPORTANT: If required by your district, an email will automatically be sent to the email address that you provided for your student that will prompt your student to sign required forms.

We will also pass out equipment the first day of tryouts, but would like to distribute as much as possible on 7/11. We will also check and help with Final Forms if you have any questions. If you do not need equipment and Final Forms is 100% complete then you do not need to come by.
- o July 15th-July 19th (Heat Acclimatization week)
- Each player *must* complete 2 days in helmet only and 3 days in helmet and shoulder pads before full pad contact evaluations, regardless of their start date.
- o July 22nd and 23rd (Full pads contact evaluations)
- O Please contact Coach Barth via email if you will be missing any time during the first 2 weeks
- Required Forms: Student-Athletes WILL NOT be able to tryout if any of the forms are missing or incomplete.
 - 1) Physical Form-Signed by Physician and dated after APRIL 15, 2024
 - *Please have this completed prior to 7/15 so student-athlete can start the first day

*Physical forms need to be uploaded to Final Forms and all other information completed in Final Forms prior to being able to start tryouts. Final Forms instructions are linked on the football page on the school website.

What to wear during first week:

- o First two days-shorts, t-shirt, helmet, football cleats
- Next three days- Shorts, t-shirt, helmet, shoulder pads, practice jersey, football cleats
- o No pants or tights below the knee are allowed during heat acclimatization week.
- o Bring running shoes in case we have to move inside to the gym due to rain.

Required equipment to be purchased:

- O White football pants with all the pads built in. The pants can be used for practice and game pants, as we will wear white pants for both home and away games.
- o Mouth piece
- O Cleats. Our school colors are navy, teal, white, and grey. It is preferred that student-athletes have cleats that are black, navy, white, or grey.
- o Practice Jersey (we have old jerseys if needed)
- *Participants may wear their own white helmet and shoulder pads, provided it meets NOSCAE standards.
- *Fees-These will be collected after tryouts
 - \$30 General Athletic Fee to be paid one time for the entire year for all sports that the student participates in.
 - <u>\$50 Football Fee</u> (covers annual cost of field paint, weed control and fertilization, football equipment, medical supplies, etc.)
